

## **Gallery Etiquette**

As we enter the summer show season, it occurred to me that a reminder might be in order on some basic exhibition and gallery etiquette. As artists we seek out opportunities to exhibit in gallery space so a larger audience can view our work. With an increased viewing public, there comes an expectation that each artist has a greater chance to sell his or her work. The gallery owner also has a stake in your success wall space is like real estate, every square inch has value. Marketing that wall space (where your work hangs) is his or her life blood. The value of that wall space is what pays the rent, the utilities, and usually means the difference between staying in business or having to close.

Often I hear artists talking about the eccentricities of gallery owners. But we must remember that marketing your artwork often takes time and constant enthusiasm on the part of the gallery owner. Bills have to be paid whether your art sells or not. So in the interest of maintaining a good relationship with your gallery owner, follow some basic guidelines.

By giving you an opportunity to exhibit, you are being extended a privilege, for which there is a price. Gallery owners must make their commission on your artwork. It is what pays the bills. Set the retail gallery price for your work at the same price you would if you sold your work outside the gallery. Do not reduce your pricing for outside sales. This creates the impression that a buyer can circumvent the gallery to save money. Be consistent in your pricing - don't undercut your gallery.

Do not attempt to promote yourself directly to gallery clients by handing out

tanya@h2oscapes.com 303-671-0306 business cards or other promotional material that might include your home or studio contact information. This also undermines a gallery owner who is providing you with an exhibition venue. Always refer gallery customers back to the gallery owner to make the sale.

Sometimes a customer may ask a gallery owner if the artist has additional pieces of work to view. Depending upon your relationship with the owner, he or she may have the customer contact you directly. Should any sales occur, professional etiquette requires the artist to provide the gallery owner with a finder's fee. Generally this is 10% of the sale. In the interest of maintaining good relations with your gallery, you should always have this discussion early on and understand the gallery's expectations. Should this come up suddenly or unexpectedly, always offer the finder's fee. It costs little, but will go a long way in cementing your relationship with your gallery owner.

The Colorado Watercolor Society will be holding longer running shows in private retail gallery spaces with increased frequency in the future. Some of our members may get referrals from these venues. Should sales occur from such referrals, remember to offer the gallery a finder's fee. Our society will benefit from your good manners and we'll cement a longer lasting relationship with these gallery partners that help sponsor our shows. An artist who voluntarily offers a finder's fee from a referral sale is exhibiting good ethics, setting the proper example, and is demonstrating true professionalism - all traits we hope to set as the hallmark of our society and its members!

From now until next November, the next six months will be an exciting time for artists working in watercolor, as CWS kicks off a "Summer of Watercolor".

Activities for the "Summer" begin the last week of this month as delegates, artists, visitors, and representatives from watercolor societies across the western U.S. begin arriving in Denver. For many of these visitors, this is their first time in Colorado. They have been telling us how excited they are to have the chance to enjoy the sights, tastes, and hospitality of Colorado.

Options on what to see and do begin as soon as they arrive: A number of groups are planning paint outs - with CWS artists acting as guides. Others are joining CWS members in the John Salminen workshop May 29 through June 1. John Salminen, as you probably know, is the juror for the Western Federation exhibition. This amazing exhibition contains 148 paintings selected from 1,034 entries, and opens on Friday, June 1, with a dessert reception from 7 pm to 9 pm. The reception is preceded by a buffet artist dinner for exhibiting artists and representatives of participating societies. Earlier on Friday these societies meet at an annual business meeting for the Western Federation of Watercolor Societies.

On Saturday, CWS is hosting a private tour of the new Hamilton building at the Denver Art Museum. CWS members, artists, delegates and visitors are invited to register for this tour.

Saturday is also the day that the CWS State Watermedia Exhibition opens. This annual exhibition showcases artists from across Colorado, and is also hosted by the Arvada Center for the Arts. In fact, the Arvada Center has committed all of it's galleries to these watermedia shows. They are excited - as are we by the unique opportunity to showcase contemporary watercolor painting, and have included us in their programs, newsletters, website, and press packets.

The month of June kicks off with a workshop with Carole Barnes (the State show juror). During the summer of 2007, CWS and the Arvada Center are planning numerous events that will bring watercolor to novices and aficionados alike. From workshops led by CWS members to docent tours of the galleries, to specially designed invitations sent to Colorado schools and art teachers, we plan to open the door to the "Summer of Watercolor".

So break out your sunscreen, grab your sunglasses and dive into the "Summer of Watercolor"!

Our guest speaker presenting this information at our next meeting is Mary Morrison.


Mary lives and works in Denver, Colorado. She received her BFA from Colorado State University and has worked full-time painting, teaching and exhibiting art for the past 18 years.

Her work has a great sense of energy and movement. Most of her imagery is taken from natural elements and the spaces of the West. Her paintings incorporate lush, textural elements with complex, vibrant colorations. The pieces are mixed-media on panel, mostly acrylics with gouache and casein. She uses collage, dripped lines, transfers prints and hand-carved stamps in building the painting. These techniques, combined with her distinctive marks give the works a rich and unique surface.

Morrison's paintings have been collected by the State of Colorado's Art in Public Places Program as well as many private and corporate collections. Most recent acquisitions include The Medical Center of the Rockies, Loveland, CO, La Costa Resort, San Diego, CA, The Pinnacle Resort, Lake Charles, LA, The University of Colorado, Boulder, CO, The Anshutz Cancer Center, Denver, CO and The Boulder Country Club, Boulder, CO.

Artists of all levels will come away with new insights for creative expression and a broader knowledge of acrylics; the most versatile painting medium today.
