THE JOURNEY TO ABSTRACTION: FROM PERCEPTION TO PERSONAL

"A painting with heart should come from the gut...expose a piece of the artist in a very raw way." On the first page of her web site, this is how Kathryn Hart introduces herself.

For our April program, Kathryn, one of our CWS members, will be the presenter and will offer a program that promises to be different, I believe very different and interesting, very interesting and very personal. Her title, *The Journey to Abstraction: From Perception to Personal*, just begins to tell the story. In her own words: "My work is now a journey of personal expression to discover how best to convey the feeling I'm intending for my idea. Paintings based upon emotion instead of perception are instantly imbued with your personality. I am guided by feeling, not a

specific image in my head." She goes on: "By loosening the reins of realism, you are free to explore the limitless boundaries of your emotional expression. You have then created something which is honest, authentic and uniquely personal. I express myself through shape, color and texture." In her artist statement, Hart says: "My works are expressions of the human condition, all of its emotional crags and crevices, what we want others to see and what we hide...who we are when we are alone."

At her April presentation, she will discuss her journey and how we can make our work more personal.

After a successful fifteen-year career as a market researcher for major medical companies, Kathryn decided to take a summer drawing class and all of her "childhood creativity and passion came flooding back." She began studying with an artist she admired and "catching up on the art education" she never got. She became a painter. In 2006 she joined the Colorado Watercolor Society and quickly established a national reputation as an award-winning representational painter. But in these realistic paintings there was a void -- something was missing. About three and a half years ago she started a slow drift to more abstract expressions. A trip to Kenva served as a pathway and catalyst towards the abstract, and she created her African Series. 2010 would be a year both difficult and inspirational. Early in the year, her mother would be diagnosed with a form of Alzheimer's. Her decline was "quick and shocking." To get through it, Kathryn had to paint and she started her "Mind Mapping Series." Powerful black, white and grey abstractions, loaded with emotion. In March of 2010. Kathrvn won Best of Show in the CWS State Exhibition. In October of 2010. with the passing of her mother the passion to paint emotionally became ever stronger. It was all on the line, revealing herself, her


Going Greener and Saving CWS Some Cash!

CWS MEMBER PROFILE: CHUCK DANFORD

Art has interesting ways to hold a mirror to life. In Chuck Danford's wildlife artwork, animals are depicted with tight detail, but outside the center of interest, the painting expands in a very loose, expressive style. This expansion echoes a similar transition in the artist's life.

The teenager who built his own hot rod later exercised his Type A personality in a successful career as a graphic

designer. Chuck graduated from the Colorado Institute of Art and held positions as art director for Channel 9 and as design director for the Denver Research Institute. He later cofounded the graphic design firm UnitOne, Inc, responsible for corporate graphics for many of Colorado largest corporations. He was, in his words, "a hard driving boss," in control of every aspect of the business. His drive and work quality won him professional recognition, including the honor of being the first inductee to the Colorado Institute of Art Hall of Fame, in 1988.

That was then. Today, Chuck is an artist with a relaxed attitude, who embraces unpredictability, and a patient instructor who encourages his students to have fun! The catalysts for change were his retirement in 1998 and the decision to become a fine artist. Fresh from retirement, he joined a photo safari tour to Africa. The trip not only established the subject matter for his art, but also placed him in a life threatening situation, when his tour bus was attacked



by armed bandits-the kind of incident that makes one reassess their priorities in life.

Free from business constraints, Chuck pursued art in his own terms. He is mostly self-taught, but has attended workshops from watercolor greats such as Tony Couch, Tom Lynch, Morton Solberg and Stephen Quiller. His paintings have won many awards and can be found in private and

public collections around the country. (See www.charlesdanford.com for a sample.)

Being both a landscape and a wildlife artist, Chuck likes to spend time in the great outdoors, in search of his often elusive subjects. He relies mostly on his excellent photography, but does extensive research, and also studies mounted animals for details: "Knowledge of wildlife is essential, as with any subject, if you are serious about painting." He wants his drawing to be precise and the habitat to be accurate, even when it is stylized. His experience in commercial art helps—the research skills, the organization of reference files and the ability to design compositions from multiple sources.

Although the artist is attuned to the environment and conservation, his paintings are neither idealized (no standing grizzlies) nor ideological (no preservation message). What comes through is aesthetic pleasure: The strong design of the composition, the varied texture and vibrant colors, the looseness of the backgrounds. Chuck loves "the effects, the spontaneity of watercolor... it is exciting, unpredictable, fresh..." Alternative techniques such as pouring and materials like Yupo further enhance the painterly aspect of his work.

Chuck is devoted to family and community. In May, he and his wife Barbara will celebrate their 49th anniversary with their three children, and with six grandchildren who are "budding artists (watercolorists of course)." In their Littleton home, Chuck balances family and art, like the paintings in his studio share wall space with his collectibles. His care will soon turn from the 450 Pez dispensers to an equivalent number of CWS members--the President-Elect has great ideas to elevate the profile of the society. To achieve this goal he can count on his experience as former president of the Art Directors Club of Denver and of the Mountainside Art Guild, and 23 years as trustee on the Porter Hospital Foundation Board, but also on a unique skill to keep tightly focused while promoting relaxed, creative surroundings, as in one of his paintings.


