## Getting it right... a goal worth pursuing!

Max Osborne, a professional photographer, is determined to achieve a goal for his clients, which is key to what he does. And, although he's been a presenter at a recent CWS meeting, he was met with a few glitches with our projection systems, they have been resolved and he is returning in February to complete his story.

I recently had an extended conversation with Max about the scope of his skills and how they apply to what we watercolorists create. His job in a nutshell is to make his client's work look good with images for archival purposes, submission to juried shows, computer-friendly transmission, printed reproductions and more. There is a significant difference in how he achieves each image for each specific purpose — he will explain each one.

It's his specialty to manipulate his camera- so we artists can do what we do best – paint watermedia creations. In other words, he takes care of all areas between the finished painting and show entry or copying.

He explained how, in digital media, a true white can be phony. And, the line between

contrasting colors can be blurred, unless the photographer has the right equipment and the knowledge to use it to his client's advantage. Things like glare zones, optical distortion, illusion of depth come into play. Hearing all this made me very grateful that people like Max are available to make it work for us, so that we don't have to.

Max will do a "show and tell" with his "tools of the trade." Once you hear his presentation you will never look at your artwork or its reproduction the same way again – he quarantees it.

Of course another concern that comes into play is cost. Max assured me that you will be pleasantly surprised, not only with the results he can achieve but all the variations of what he provides to his clients for what he charges.

Also, part of the evening's presentations will be Gene Youngmann's slide presentation of all CWS members' paintings that were accepted into this year's Western Fed juried show. What a colorful presentation that will be.

## Message from the President

I was very fortunate to visit the John Singer Sargent Watercolors exhibit at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston a few times during a recent trip. In an earlier article, I wrote about the rarity of museum exhibits of their watercolor

collections. In this case two major museums, Brooklyn and Boston, combined their collections of over 90 pieces by the artist for display of outstanding quality and widely varied subject matter. The range of work is impressive: Portraits and figures, interiors, garden views, Venetian scenes, Bedouin camps, Alpine huts, ships and fishermen, and quarry sketches that bordered on the abstract. The artist's unusual compositions—the unusual points of view, and the way he cropped his subject--make it clear that Sargent was not interested in creating souvenirs of a travel location, but in capturing light as it affected different objects and shapes at a given time.

To us watercolorists, it is his use of the medium that is most remarkable. Sargent's paintings are nothing like the watercolors of his time--no delicate color schemes with pure application of multiple transparent washes and careful placement of precise details. They are dramatic, intensely charged with color, show bold strokes and a large variety of techniques and combination of media. Sargent was not disregarding conventions in protest, he was simply ignoring them—he was not trying to impress the watercolor clubs and was not trying to make watercolors for sale. Unencumbered by

the demands of the art market and by the usual rules that domesticate watercolor,he could focus instead on capturing his subject, and making unique works of art. He worked fast and assuredly, either preserving whites with masking or wax, or recovering them later with wiping, lifting, scratching, or covering with opaque paint. Priority was to portray the light as it revealed shapes and forms and textures; details where necessary could be painted in, lifted



out, added as lines or reinforced with pencil marks. Strokes were small or large; colors went from separate to mixed to superimposed, pigment application ranged from faintly diluted to impasto so thick that it cracked when dry. Sargent used any means at hand to make his statement, without any tentativeness.

The result is vitality and character. Sargent's watercolors show atypical strength, and do not need to be considered separately as watercolors, but can claim their status as works of art and stand up to any other media. They are further confirmation to me that the established "rules" of watercolor, prevalent since the days of Sargent—painting "pure" transparent watercolors, in multiple washes, from light to dark, avoiding pencil marks and other media, abhoring mud, etc.—create difficulties for a medium that is simplicity itself. They restrict the artist's expressiveness and creativity, and keep watercolor from reaching and showing its true potential. We can sometimes let our awareness of "watercolor" get in the way of producing Art.

In Sargent's watercolors, the creative process is so apparent that and in looking at the paper you view as much a presentation of the artist in action as you see a depicted scene. Ultimately, all of those paintings are self-portraits of his. All Art is a self-portrait, the only question is whether it is masked by convention, or, as in his case, the representation of a true self.
