Every one of us is on a journey with our artistic abilities as expressed through watercolor. We continually ask ourselves, "Is this working?" or, "Should I try something different?" or, "How do I solve this problem?" And, the list goes on.

We all would agree that watercolor painting is a process and not a destination. As we develop our skills, we learn something new and unlearn others. Brushes, paints and paper have a way of interacting in ever-changing ways - sometimes it works and sometimes it doesn't. Either way, the learning process continues and the opportunities can be limitless – and, that's a good thing.

This March at the CWS monthly meeting we will once again have the opportunity to subject our individual learning processes to a Critique. It's meant to be that special time when two very capable jurors evaluate our latest work, either in its completed state or in process of completion. This critique helps both the artist whose creation it is and the observers who are in attendance. Everyone can benefit and be encouraged no matter the skill level.

The jurors that have stepped forward this time are very qualified in this regard. Randy Hale is an accomplished watercolorist in his own right. His western work ethic and ranch life experience, especially with horses, often

provide inspiration for the subjects in his paintings. His use of strong colors is very convincing as to his level of accomplishment. He is also a very capable teacher in watercolor - he teaches all skill-levels. Randy is a hands-on type of instructor and one can not help but learn from him.

And the other juror is Judy Patti. She is the personification of a watercolor teacher that has fun working with color to create the unexpected. She has the innate ability to instill in her students an "I can do this" attitude and, they indeed "can do it" too. Her bubbly personality and positive attitude about art can get everyone excited about the possibilities with a brush loaded with paint.

So, bring that painting you just completed or are still working on – and, let Randy and Judy give you a critique that will change the way you paint – for the better! All paintings - only one per person, please - can be framed or unframed, without glass, so all can clearly see your creation.

A great time will be had by everyone attending this most entertaining and informative program at 7pm on Tuesday, March 18th at the First Plymouth Congregational Church (SW corner of Colorado Blvd. & Hampden). Bring a painting... bring a friend – all are welcome!

Thinking Self-Critically

I hope a lot of our members take the opportunity to attend our March meeting for the critique program to be led by expert artists and instructors Randy Hale and Judy Patti. Similarly, I hope for a lot of interest in the upcoming revival of the CWS North Critique group. I am thrilled at both accounts, as I see critiques as an incredibly valuable tool for the artist.

Painting is easy, but making a successful painting is such a difficult and complex activity, with a myriad of aspects and options to consider—subject matter, composition and design, technique, color and temperature, value, texture, etc. The mastery of each element requires lots of practice, and we need help in figuring out where we are and where to focus our effort next. This is where I think critiques come in as most helpful, by pointing you in the next direction. Think of them as navigation devices.

The praise and "constructive criticism" of pieces can offer some encouragement and guidance. But I believe the most useful is when critique or self-critique becomes a creative exercise, by asking "what if..." This means looking at a painting (of yours or someone else's) and asking yourself "Would this be better if..." or "What happens when..." For example: "Would this portrait be better if the shirt was a different color, if there was more space to the left, if I softened that edge" or "what happens when you cover that tree, when you add this color accent..." This kind of assessment

also reveals what is working and what is not working on the piece, but has the added benefit of indicating options and solutions. It also keeps us focused on the process, rather than on the painting as a finished product—if it is not great, it is because we have not finished our way through it yet. A creative problem can be identified by analysis, but it can only be solved by a creative process.

Please join us in welcoming Kathy, celebrating our updated Bylaws, and making the State Exhibit reception and the March critique a great success. See you there!

General CWS Critique Guidelines

- 1. Bringing paintings for critiques is strictly voluntary and not a requirement for membership or participation.
- 2. Paintings do not have to be finished, they can be in progress, those paintings, which have caused stress or struggles are good candidates for critique, to hear suggestions for resolution and ways to successfully finish them.
- 3. Paintings should NOT be framed or under glass. Paintings should NOT be in a plastic sleeve because of the glare. Please remove the sleeve if used for transportation.
- 4. Paintings should be attached to a board to give them support, with either clips, tape or stapled to the surface.
- 5. Large paintings are easier to see in a large group but that does not exclude smaller paintings, they are always welcome.
- Mats are optional, if a mat is used it should be white or off white.
- 7. The comments of the person(s) critiquing your artwork should be taken as a suggestion and are no way meant to judge the

- value of your artwork. Sometimes the comments and suggestions will need to be applied to your next painting experience and not to the painting being critiqued.
- 8. Critiques are a useful tool and help us grow as artists.


